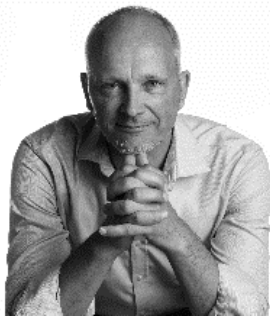

Professor Andrea Bishop

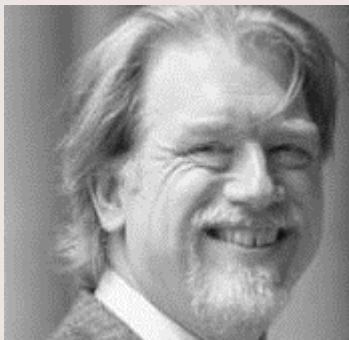
